




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This is **newsletter 4** for Project ASSENT extension.

We have finished all focus group discussions












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We have finished all interviews

Other thoughts were grouped into 6 categories:











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Presentation includes:

- use of colour
- font size
- pictures
- and animations



Media: the use pictures and its relevance



Navigation: how easy it is for users to move through the guidance



Language: making sure the meaning is clear using the fewest possible words.











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Scenarios: example of cases that show adjustments to support inclusion.

Resources: adding in a checklist of potential adjustments and supports for consideration.

Making changes to online guidance



The suggestions we received have been written as action points.











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The actions points are changes to be made to the online guidance



We have given the actions points to the company helping us to develop the guidance

Money for impact



Alex worked as a researcher on Project ASSENT for **three months**.











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He looked at changes to be made to the **law**



The law about **including people** in **research**



who may have difficulties with **making** their own **decisions**.













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We wrote and submitted our thoughts about the changes online



on the 14th of July 2022.



A report was written and sent to authorities responsible for the changes.



We are looking forward to the changes that will be made to the law.

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List of difficult words

Capacity difficulties - Finding it difficult to think what something means to you, to remember it, and to make a decision.

Communication difficulties - Finding it difficult to understand what people say and to say what you think.

Practitioner – a person who practices something specific. For example, a medical doctor or psychologist.

Focus group – a group of people that discuss a particular topic together.

Advisory group – a group of people who gives us advice for our project.











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Research Ethics Committee – teams who read research proposals and say whether it is safe and sound or not work.
