Over the past 12 months we have forged strong collaborative working opportunities with many of our Norfolk and Waveney System partners. Our four NICHE Workstreams: Workforce Intelligence; Place Based Innovation; Workforce Optimisation and Evaluation have become established all underpinned by 'good' governance. We have awarded NICHE Fellowships; Kintsugi and Mini (match funded) Kintsugi Projects. We are supporting individuals in their professional development through Scholarships and learning embedded in their practice setting. In essence it has been a busy first year for NICHE!

### **KINTSUGI**

Using the metaphor of 'Kintsugi' 1 NICHE have funded both Kintsugi and Mini (match funded) Kintsugi projects. Underpinning each of Kintsugi projects is a focus on developing Embedded Research 2 or Service Improvement Evaluation drawing on the key principles of building:

- **Research capacity** across the Norfolk and Waveney ICS and within/ across participating organisations.
- · **Research capability** as part of workforce development and transformation underpinned by Embedded Research.
- **Research confidence** of those leading and participating in the Programmes creating a 'ripple effect' enabling growth and ongoing development.

### **Kintsugi Projects**

- Developing an intervention to support the retention of health and social care professionals in Norfolk – School of Social Work, UEA.
- Evaluating the Impact and Effectiveness of Structure, Process and Outcomes of the Take a Chance on me Programme – Take a Chance on Me, Social Enterprise.
- Norwich Museums Community Club, an embedded evaluation Norwich Museums.
- Evaluation of a novel early career prescribing programme to support workforce development, retention and diversification of pharmacists in the East of England – School of Pharmacy, UEA.

# Community Culture Club at the Museum of Norwich by Rosalind Hewett

Heritage sites, museums and arts venues important roles in play communities, providing safe and welcoming places for people to come together. Community Culture Club is a creative wellbeing programme based at the Museum of Norwich at the Bridewell. The programme is designed for older adults living with dementia, carers, people with long-term health conditions, and those who are lonely or socially isolated. The first cohort of the Community Club ran from November 2021-February 2022. After a successful pilot, a second cohort ran from November 2022-February 2023. Funding from NICHE will support three further cohorts, with a special focus on developing a creative embedded evaluation model.

Community Culture Club aims to support people's wellbeing by:

- Decreasing feelings of loneliness
- Creating new social connections
- Delivering activities designed with joy at their core
- Treating people as sensory beings
- Using history to connect to our presentday selves

The programme is grounded in several key delivery commitments to achieve these aims. Sensory engagement: ensuring that multiple senses are engaged in each session, providing opportunities for participants to taste, touch, smell, look and listen. Practical: each session culminates in a creative intervention and art-making. Everyone is encouraged to have a go, supported by staff. Identity: changes caused by dementia may lead to changes in a person's sense of identity.

So treating the person with dementia as an individual rather than defining them by the condition or focusing on negative aspects, such as lost abilities, is significant.

Community Culture Club constantly evolves based on how people respond to the activity and staff development. Learning is now influencing delivery with other vulnerable service users. The funding from NICHE allows us to develop this practice further and to develop a model that other practitioners could train in, including the embedded evaluation toolkit we are developing. We are so excited for this next step of the Community Culture Club journey. Here's a beautiful quote from one of our past participants:

"The nurturing I have received within the group is helping me recover from my experiences of loss and to rebuild my confidence. I have a greater sense of belonging and ability to plan outings for myself now. Kindness can be contagious and so I hope that the improvement in my wellbeing might allow me to respond with compassion for others who are lonely or suffering."

# Norfolk & Waveney Teaching & Learning Care Home Programme

The <u>Teaching and Learning Care Home Programme</u> (TLCH) was commissioned by the former Norfolk and Waveney Clinical Commissioning Group and ran until early Summer 2023. It provided an opportunity working with 3 Care Homes to explore and understand the impact of delivering a programme of practice development across a geographic area. The programme was jointly delivered and evaluated by the former ImpACT Research Group (now NICHE) and the Foundation of Nursing Studies.


Underpinning the Programme Evaluation was the core purpose of the TLCH Programme, a 'Good Care Experience' focussed on the three interrelated themes:

- Creating Education and learning for staff and students
- Enabling research and practice development from practice
- Facilitating community engagement

Underpinning these interrelated themes are:

- Working collaboratively across Sectors/ Systems
- Acting as a resources across the Social Care Sector

Participants identified that the TLCH Programme provided them with opportunities to work, learn and collaborate with each other along with system partners across their geographic area post the COVID-19 Pandemic. The TLCH Programme also provided them with an opportunity to explore their practice (linked to their workplace projects) to enable better resident outcomes.

Increasingly participating homes identified the opportunity to strategically influence whilst recognising and celebrating their achievements. This was fundamental and important to participating Care Homes when the 'context' (at times) was so challenging linked to workload, managing vacancies and the need to constantly adapt ways of working linked to the COVID-19 Pandemic. The participating Care Homes also identified that the opportunity to learn and work together helped to build new relationships in which learning from each other was an underpinning enabler to support development along with the opportunities for informal support.

The NICHE Fellowship allows for the evaluation of the sustainability of this innovative pathway, along with prompting the dissemination of good practice in antenatal services regionally.


