HOW WOULD I FUND STUDYING ABROAD?

A year or semester abroad is an exchange programme so there are no tuition fees at your host university.

UEA fees will remain the same for a semester abroad. If you choose a year abroad, you pay only a percentage of UEA fees.



Student Finance tuition and maintenance loans continue during your semester or year abroad. Check out the Student Finance travel grant to see what extra funding you can apply for.

WHAT SUPPORT IS AVAILABLE WHILE I'M AWAY?

Global Development student Molly spent a year studying at Universidad de las Américas Puebla (UDLAP) in Mexico.

"My academic experience at UDLAP was exceptional. I was able to choose modules that I couldn't take at UEA – such as human thought, geopolitics and strategic analysis, as well as myth, magic and religion. The courses are largely based on Mexican history and culture and I was able to take a module in Contemporary Mexican Politics and Multicultural Theory – which focused on indigenous rights and identity within Mexico. As a result I am now writing my dissertation based on themes I studied in these classes.

UDLAP is in the beautiful town of Cholula, which has so much to offer, as well as easy access to Puebla, Mexico City and the coast. Mexican culture is incredible – from the amazing food to the Spanish language and lovely people.

I am very grateful for my study abroad year – it gave me the opportunity to study a wide range of subjects, immerse myself in a different culture and gain a variety of new interests."

"I spent a semester at Simon Fraser University. I've always wanted to travel to Canada and was drawn to the size and diversity of Vancouver. It's such a varied city, with a vast metropolitan centre, and proximity to a range of beautiful landscapes. I relished the idea of living somewhere on a much bigger scale!

I loved learning from the perspective of another country and culture, and being immersed in Canadian literature that I wouldn't have had the chance to study at UEA.

My accommodation was on-campus, living with three students I was matched with through a personality quiz. The student community was very welcoming, and living in the student village was so lively, I always felt like I belonged.

My semester abroad was such an exciting and jam-packed few months. If you're considering studying abroad, I would really encourage you to look into this option – it was such a rewarding experience."

"This was my first time travelling abroad by myself, and the study abroad team ensured I was ready for my trip. They made me feel a lot more confident and able to travel alone.

Chris spent a year studying at the University of Wollongong near Sydney, Australia, as part of his UEA **Environmental Sciences degree.**

"The decision to study abroad not only has a profound impact on the time that you are abroad, but it also becomes an integral part of you for the rest of your life. When signing up, most of us probably focus on the chance to visit new places, meet new people and learn new skills. At the time, the long-term career benefits are hard to quantify or appreciate. However, as a recent graduate it is these benefits that I notice more and more as my career progresses.

Since my year in Australia, I have graduated, completed a Master's Degree and now work as a Hydrologist (that's water, rivers and flooding for those who don't know). Although my study abroad days seem a distant memory, the experiences and skills that I developed stay with me.

The two most noticeable skills I developed were my self-confidence and communication. Studying abroad led me on adventures with highs and lows. I was taken out of my comfort zone on a regular basis and it was down to me to

make the most of each situation. This really helped me develop confidence in my own ideas and abilities.

As an employee of an international company, I regularly hold meetings with colleagues from around the globe. Immersing myself in another culture during my study abroad year gives me great confidence, to this day, in communicating and creating connections with people from different cultures and walks of life.

Employers value study abroad experiences in potential candidates. At every interview I've been to, I've been asked about my time in Australia. My current employer even asked me to compare the weather and hydrology conditions of the UK and Australia. Studying abroad shows you have depth and richness to your character which really helps you stand out.

There is nothing more exciting than experiencing and immersing yourself in a completely different lifestyle and culture, while having the support of a university as a safety net. It will be the best decision you make, help you improve as a person, and have a lasting effect on your life and career."
