#### **Marianne Coddington**

We are very sorry to report the death of Marianne Coddington on the 12th March 2024, aged 91 years, in the care home where she spent her last few weeks. Her life was celebrated at Earlham Crematorium and later at the Friends Meeting House: she was an active member of the Quakers.

Marianne was born and grew up in Switzerland, and retained a strong Swiss identity throughout her life. She had a scientific background in Switzerland and subsequently came to work in the UK at the John Innes Laboratories in Hertfordshire where she met, and later married, her husband Alan. They moved to Norwich when Alan became a lecturer in BIO at UEA. Marianne devoted much of her time to helping others, e.g. as an adviser at the CAB and

later as a bereavement visitor at Priscilla Bacon Lodge. Her many interests included music particularly, and anthroposophy: she was involved in the setting up of the Rudolf Steiner School in Norwich. She was a sculptor as is evident around her home which also has a fine collection of indoor plants that she carefully nurtured.

We extend our sincere condolences to Alan, to their children Sandy and Peter (and daughter-in-law Catherine) and to their grandchildren Sebastian and Connor.

### Personal message from Alan Coddington

Marianne was first diagnosed with mixed type dementia in 2021. This deteriorated slowly at first but eventually she had to go into a care home where she died. She was born in and grew up around, Zurich in Switzerland. She trained as a Medical Laboratory Technician and ended up there working for the Red Cross blood transfusion service. In 1957, to widen her experience and improve her English, she got a job as a research assistant to a Dr. Harris in the Sir William Dunn School of Pathology in Oxford. There, she helped him grow human cancer cells in tissue culture, in the lab. In 1960, Dr. Harris became head of a newly -created Cell Biology Department at the John Innes Institute, then in Hertford. She moved there with him and that's where I came on the scene. I got a job there too, in the Genetics Department. We quickly got friendly and the rest, as they say, is history. We married in 1963 and in 1965. I got a job in BIO. So we moved to Norwich. I retired in 1997 but I had already got involved with a small group who had the idea of starting an association for retired UEA staff. In 1999 this was eventually established. This allowed us, as a couple, to get involved in getting the RA going. We took part in all the talks, walks and outings and were overjoyed when the HF Walking Holidays became part of the programme. Not forgetting the sightseeing holidays for the less active! So you can see that the RA came at good time in our lives. Finally, a personal thank you to you all for your friendship and companionship over the, years.

#### Tuesday, 25 June 'A Skip to the Future' by Elizabeth Talbot (preceded by AGM)

"A Skip to the Future" by Elizabeth Talbot, a Director of TW Gaze Diss Auction Rooms, is a timeline of auction house evolution, 1985 - 2024; a talk presented from her personal perspective across the years. It incorporates interesting insights into changes and developments within the industry, and contrasts them with how the profession once worked. It will touch upon how auctions are compiled and marketed; what defines and influences value; the impact of legislation, and the power of media, modern technology and communications. For better or worse, things are certainly different.

# Tuesday, 24 September'Why the Wreck of the Gloucester in 1682 Matters:<br/>The Secrets of a Restoration Warship' by Professor Claire Jowitt

Claire is Professor of Renaissance Studies in the School of History at UEA. She is the Historical Lead of the Gloucester project.

The Gloucester was an English warship launched in 1654 and participated in several global conflicts before it was lost on 6 May 1682 when it struck a sandbank off North Norfolk. It was transporting James, Duke of York (later James II) from London to Edinburgh when it was lost.

#### Tuesday, 22 October 2024 'Music doesn't quite tell all' by Frank Lawlor

"What's it called and who wrote it"? These are perhaps the first things we want to know about a piece of music which comes to our attention for the first time. However, the circumstances behind the writing can often be revelatory and enhance our understanding and our listening pleasure. This talk/performance, will focus on a few examples.

#### Tuesday, 26 November 2024 'Flowers of Norfolk, with some mention of Wildlife' by Simon Harrop

Anne and Simon Harrop own and manage Natural Surroundings at Bayfield, near Holt. It is also called the Norfolk's Wildlife and Wildflower Centre, and recently became an RHS partner garden.

This is a walk of just over 5 miles (with a slightly shorter option). We meet at the Bell Hotel in the centre of Saxmundham and we suggest you park in the town car park (50 yards away).

From there we head east and up Church Hill to turn south following a footpath through agricultural land reaching the edge of Sternfield via a sunken lane. We then take a quiet road into Benhall, crossing the ford and having an opportunity to explore the small community nature reserve. Continuing through the village we cross the B1112 taking footpaths across The Layers to return to Saxmundham for lunch at The Bell. There is a ditch to scramble through but this can be avoided by taking the shorter route back to the town. Please arrive by 10.15 to order lunch and be ready for a 10.30 start.

This approx. 4.5 mile walk will start and end at the Norfolk Wildlife Trust Cley Marshes Visitor Centre.

This is a circular walk a little over 5 miles long starting from the Outney Common car park on the edge of Bungay. The walk is mainly along grassy tracks with a short distance on minor roads. There are no stiles and it is generally good underfoot. Some parts of the walk have tree cover providing shade if it is very sunny. There are no booked lunch arrangements for this walk, the options being to picnic on Outney Common at the end of the walk, have lunch at the adjoining golf club, or walk a short distance into Bungay where there are more opportunities for refreshments. There is also another nice picnic spot near the castle in Bungay, although it may be quite busy during the school holidays.

From the car park we walk a short distance into Bungay where there are public toilets available. We then proceed via the Bigod's Castle grounds on pavements until we reach a footpath by the river. From here we walk to Earsham Mill and church where we will have a short refreshment break and an opportunity to look in the church or in the art gallery etc at the mill. There is also a cafe and toilets at the mill. Proceeding from Earsham we make our way into the Bath Hills and curve back round to Outney Common.

Over 200 salvia varieties feature through the planting of over 12,000 plants attracting masses of bees and butterflies. There are acer trees, interesting garden structures and a water feature. Suitable in most parts for wheelchairs.
