

Options with a Sociology Degree

Many Sociology graduates are attracted to careers that centre on the challenges and demands that members of a society face. While some will enter work in a social or welfare related role, there are also opportunities in a wide range of other occupations throughout the private and public sectors.

Studying this degree will provide you with the following skill sets: communication, interpersonal, problem-solving, presentation, reflective thinking and analytical skills. You will also gain skills in appreciating the complexity and diversity of social situations, researching, judging and evaluating complex information, as well as gaining the ability to scrutinise and reassess common perceptions of the social world. BA in Sociology can offer exciting career opportunities in social services, education, criminal justice, welfare services, government, counselling, charities and the wider voluntary sector, to name just a few. The degree creates additional opportunities to undertake further academic studies that could enable you to pursue careers in

- Social work
- Teaching and education
- Forensic science
- Solicitor or barrister

There is every opportunity for an interesting and challenging career ahead of you.

What do Sociology graduates do?

Here are a few of the most popular career areas explicitly linked to a degree in Sociology:

- Social researcher (for example planning, designing and managing social research projects using a variety of methods, to help shape policy or examine effectiveness of existing policy)
- Social worker (Children and Families, young offenders, adult services, etc)
- Youth worker (in a variety of settings, including colleges, faith-based groups, youth centres, schools)
- Policy officer (researching and advising on issues, carrying out developmental work, campaigning for change)
- Police / Probation officer (and other roles within the Criminal Justice system)
- Public affairs consultant (providing clients with political and public policy advice, lobbying, etc)


