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## **OBITUARIES**

#### **Frederick J Vine**

We are very sorry to report the death, on 21 June last, of Fred Vine. He had Alzheimer's and was in a Care Home for the last few years of his life. He grew up in London and went to Latimer Upper School and then in 1959 to St, John's College, Cambridge where he read Natural Sciences. The Geology and Geophysics courses taught by Professor Bullard appealed to him most, so it was no surprise when he did a Ph.D. in this area. During this time he interpreted magnetic anomalies in the rocks on the sea floor, either side of the mid-Atlantic ridge, as being due to sea-floor spreading. The first proof of movement of tectonic plates. In 1964 Fred and Sue married and in 1965 they went to Princeton for 5 years. Fred was appointed to ENV in 1970. Fred was an inspiring teacher and sympathetic administrator. He was twice Dean of the School.

Once in Norwich, they soon found a house on Christchurch Rd. We moved near them in 1972. Their two children, Rachel and Stephen , were of similar ages to ours and the two families soon made friends. Fred and I rode our bikes up the Avenues to the UEA and often met for a chat. Another point of contact was the 6th. Norwich Sea Scout Group on Jessopp Rd. My son Peter and Stephen joined the Cubs and progressed to the Scouts and Venture Scouts, Fred and I became Scout Leaders. I have fond memories of the Summer Camps. Around 1980 the VentureScouts took in Girls! So my daughter, Alex and Rachel joined too. What 's more, Sue became a Venture Leader! She led a small group, including Rachel, Peter and Stephen, who walked the Pennine Way. This was a big event in their lives. So you see, the Vine family have had a big effect on the lives of my family.

## Dr David Wildon

I am very sad to report that David Wildon died on 27 July, 2024, at the age of 86. David was born in the Australian town of Naracoorte. His mother later moved to Sydney, where David was educated firstly at Sydney Boy's High School and then at Sydney University where he got a degree in Agriculture, followed by a PhD working on Cyanobacteria in the Botany Department. He won a travelling fellowship which resulted in him arriving in the School of Biological Sciences in 1967 where he became a lecturer in Plant Biology. In 1968 he married Gilly, also a lecturer in BIO.

To say that David was a brilliant and dedicated teacher very much understates his abilities. Not only did he teach a plant physiology course which received stellar student ratings but he also found a way of teaching statistics which the first year students actually understood and enjoyed. He was a total perfectionist when it came to giving his students the best possible experience at UEA. He brought the same perfectionist attitude to administration and research and in 2000 he was elected Dean of BIO, a post that he occupied with great distinction.

After his retirement David regularly went on the retirement association local walks. He and Gilly were stalwarts of the associated walking holidays which covered many different terrains not available in Norfolk. He also did online university history courses and became quite an expert on the Industrial Revolution. Sadly over the last few years his health began to fail and eventually he moved into Hethersett Hall, where he died.

Our condolences go to Gilly and their son Mark. Personally I miss him very much as an always amiable golf partner and a source of interesting and stimulating conversation.

## Walking Holiday at Abingworth 6-10 October 2025

Our Holiday in 2025 will be at Abingworth in the South Downs. This is a Monday to Friday holiday with walks on the Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. On this holiday we will have fully guided walks with HF Leaders and they will provide transport to and from the walks. The walks programme will be published nearer the time. The house is close to Thakeham, Postcode RH20 3EF. There's more at:

We have booked the whole house, which is slightly smaller than the house in Whitby. We will initially give priority to walkers. The walking on the South Downs is "undulating", but has no major challenges. The HF house in Abingworth is on a main road with a bus service. If you would like to come as a non-walker, please let us know, but don't pay your deposit until we know whether there's a space.

The cost of the holiday is currently quoted at £585 per person. All rooms are en suite. The price includes bed, breakfast, packed lunch for everyone and an evening meal. We will organise a coach from Norwich if there are enough takers and share the cost between all the passengers.

Booking the whole house has great benefits for us, not least we don't pay single or other supplements! However, we do have to pay our deposits very early to secure the whole house. A deposit of  $\pounds75$  is needed, with the booking form to secure your booking. The booking form can be found towards the end of this newsletter.

**Please do ensure you have appropriate travel insurance.** If you need to cancel for any reason, you will lose your deposit. The final balance will be due at the beginning of August 2025 and is not refundable.

Please note that there may be limited numbers for some pub lunches, and these will be allocated on a strictly 'first come first served' basis (so it pays to contact the walk leader as early as possible!).

These walks, and all other sporting and leisure activities, have inherent hazards associated with them. This circular walk explores the line of the medieval city walls, a distance of around 4.5 miles. We start in the Car Park for the Premier Inn Norwich Nelson City Centre Hotel, although hopefully some of you will make use of the many bus routes to Norwich Station.

We start by following the Riverside Walk to Carrow Bridge and the Boom Towers and then reach the most difficult and most interesting section. There are 100 variable steps, generally with hand-rail support. Carrow Hill provides an alternative - the same upward climb but no steps. From then on the route is mainly on roads, via Chapelfield and those parts of the City Centre north of the river, until we return to Riverside Walk, potentially muddy in patches.

Please arrive by 10.15 for a 10.30 start. Drivers will need to sign in for the 3 hours of free parking, linked to the restaurant. (Details are being discussed but if an extra hour has to be paid for, it would cost  $\pounds 1.50$ .)

# UEA Retirement Association: Privacy Statement

## What information do we hold about you and where does it come from?

The information we hold about you is taken from the membership application form which you complete each year. On that form we ask for your name, address, telephone number and email address so that we can contact you for the purposes set out below. Also, for joint membership, we ask for the name of your spouse/partner.

## Who has access to this information and how is it used?

The information you provide is held confidentially by the Executive Committee and is used, for example:

- 1. as a basis for distributing the copies of Renaissance that members receive during the year;
- 2. as a basis for publishing notices to wider groups of members;
- 3. by Group Organisers to contact participants of the interest group concerned;
- 4. by Outing or Holiday Organisers to contact participants in an outing or Holiday.

Communication with you may be via any of the contact details you choose to give us on your membership form but for speed and convenience, as well as cost, the Committee uses email where possible, rather than letter post or telephone, to notify members of important events, notices, holidays and confirmation of outing bookings.

No data will be shared with any other organisation or individuals without your permission (other than Executive Committee members and RA members who organise activities of the kind noted above, where needed for the purpose of contacting members who participate in those activities).

## How long will we hold the information about you?
