





SOFTNConference 2025 : Conference Report

17 November 2026

Purpose: This Conference Report outlines the vision and outcomes of the three-day international *Shaping Our Futures Through New Coalitions (SOFTN) Conference*, held in Sri Lanka, 27-29th October 2025.

The conference was delivered over 3 days to 135 participants consisting of students, practitioners, academics, researchers, community scientists and political leaders from six countries. Each representing collaborative work achieved across multiple organisations, over the past 4 years (2022 – 2025) associated with working to promote population health within coastal, rural and isolated communities addressing health inequalities magnified by climate change.

Background: The original concept was identified during the NHS Mental Health Curriculum Sri Lanka Project, funded by NHS England East of England, as a collaborative between Norfolk and Suffolk Mental Health Care Trust, Cambridge and Peterborough NHS Trust, NHS England and University of East Anglia (UEA). This work was associated with a UK government backed initiative to achieve additional international nurses into the UK health and social care economy. However, the field work quickly identified that, through active engagement in delivering a combined NHS Mental health awareness programme and English language training, the outcomes achieved were more about outreach (in terms of workforce capacity and local practice improvements) that went far beyond a short-term recruitment campaign and skills programme.

The partnering delivery team recognised early the potential for sustainable relationship building, as opportunities for mutual knowledge exchange relating to a global health population, workforce crisis and associated climate challenges that continue to impact those most at risk (e.g. maternal and mental health of individuals and communities).

In discussion with the General Sir John Kotewala Defence University Vice Chancellor, and the Dean of Faculty of Allied Health Sciences, the idea for a conference was initially discussed as a way of scaling collaborative achievements, disseminating programme outcomes and inspiring the future health care workforce.





















Approach: An international steering committee was convened in January 2025 consisting of partner organisations engaged in several different collaborative projects via a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with UEA, all of which had common themes of population health challenges and associated workforce advancements.

International Steering and Scientific Committee consisted of:

- *University of Sharjah* (UoS), United Arab Emirates: Professor Mohammed Allemadine, Dean Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences, was an invited key note speaker. Dr Jaqueline Dias, Head of Nursing and Dr Mohammed Taihi (Head of Allied Health Professions) were scientific and steering committee members.
- University of West Indies (UWI), Trinidad and Tobago: Dr Oscar Ocho (former
 Director of Nursing and Health Sciences) has engaged in work with Prof Sally Hardy
 since 2013 considering mental health literacy and crisis risk management for the
 Caribbean. Dr Oscar Ocho was a member of the International Steering Committee,
 Scientific Committee, Session Chair and Home Group co-facilitator.
- *University of Technology* (UTECH) Jamaica: Professor Adella Campbell, Dean of College was an International Committee member, session Chair, and Home Group co-facilitator.
- **Federation University**, Australia: Professor Michael Ojasoli, Head of Mental Health was an International Committee member, session Chair, and Home Group cofacilitator.
- General Sir John Kotewala Defence University (KDU), Sri Lanka: Hosted the conference in Colombo Sri Lanka. The Vice Chancellor Rear Admiral HGU Dammika Kumara was in attendance as honoured guest at the inaugural session. The Dean of Faculty of Allied Health Sciences, Surgeon Captain Dr Ranga Perera, attended the opening ceremony, day 1 and 2 events. Dr Kalpani Abhayasinghe, was an International Committee member, Day 2 Host, and session facilitator for the symposium of Community of Scientists, led by the Foundation for Health Promotion, and the Mindfulness sessions, led by the most Venerable Uda Eriyagama Dhammajiva Maha Thero, Satipasala Foundation.
- NICHE at UEA was present and provided significant input in planning and managing the three-day conference. Professor Sally Hardy was the Conference Chair, delivered an interactive workshop and co-presented several papers over the three





















days. Idris Phillips Fry was the Conference Secretary, with Joseph Collins providing IT and Admin support. Scarlet Williams was the technical and design lead, providing the SOFTNConference25 communications strategy (via the Conference website, Social Media campaign, conference brochure and signage). Dr Johnny Yuen led delivered concurrent sessions and acted as Chair to several events. Madeline Johnson (UEA MSC mental health nurse alumni) engaged as student ambassador, and site visit facilitator, panel member and concurrent session lead. Anca Mena, NICHE fellow presented a concurrent session. Shiju Shijudas, Education facilitator from NSFT presented a concurrent session and panel discussion. Claire Thompson, NICHE Scholar lead a creative interactive workshop. Rosalind Hewitt, NICHE Kintsugi Lead, and colleagues Holly Sandiford and Susie Childerhouse led an interactive workshop outlining the Norwich Museums Culture Club for Dementia. Samantha Coleman delivered on behalf of NICHE fellow Rene Grey, the Out of Bed Project. Dr Pinar Guslu Uven (NICHE economic evaluator) delivered a concurrent session using Dual Track Methodology, evaluating NICHE economic impact. • United Kingdom was represented through the RCN International team, Elsa Alfonso, Sally Wilson, and the Mental Health PSI lead, Catherine Gamble. Ann Jackson consulting led an interactive workshop on Compassion and Self Compassion in the workplace and Paul Johnson was the Keynote Speaker Day 1, attended as independent consultants. The Caribbean Nursing and Midwifery Association UK were also represented through the President Paulette Lewis, and Vice President Maurina Baron, who were conference chairs and co-delivered a concurrent session on Global Citizenship and panel discussion members.

Conference Programme: A three-day programme offered delegates choice of activities including 3 daily Keynote Speaker sessions, 11 concurrent sessions, 9 interactive workshops, 2 site visits, 4 home groups, 2 social events, poster viewing and 1 symposium.

The conference venue, Cinnamon Lakeside Hotel is in central Colombo, which offered two main areas for conference activities: the main ballroom and a second break out area Dukes Court, where concurrent sessions and workshops were also on offer during the morning and afternoon sessions. Posters were on display along the corridor space of the Ballroom.

Day 1: Monday 27th October 2025.

The opening ceremony welcomed 30 invited dignitaries as special guests, including Dr Anhil Jasinghe, Secretary of the Ministry of Health and Mass Media, Sri Lanka. A full list of those invited guests in attendance is available as appendix 1. KDU provided cultural performances and a traditional oil lamp lighting ceremony. Speeches and a short welcome address from the Conference Chair achieved a culturally significant opening ceremony, followed by presentations as set out in the brochure. Home groups were offered at the end of each day for further reflection on learning and networking opportunities. An evening drinks reception sponsored by Federation University, was undertaken on a pontoon boat across the lagoon.

Day 2: Tuesday 28th October 2025

A second keynote address was followed by an interactive symposium presented by Community Scientists in association with the Foundation for Health Promotion, Sri Lanka. A Mindfulness workshop in the afternoon was delivered by most Venerable Monks from one of the oldest monasteries in Sri Lanka. A site visit was also arranged in the afternoon to the SOS Children's Village Pilihandala. Concurrent presentation sessions were also underway. The evening conference dinner was a Sri Lanka themed event, attended by the Former VC of KDU, Major General (Retired) Milinda Peiris and Faculty Dean, Surgeon Captain Dr Ranga Perera. The Special Guest for the evening who gave some inspirational words on his humanitarian work, was Roshan Mahanama, perhaps more famously known for his International Cricketing achievements.

Day 3: Wednesday 29th October 2025

The third keynote address was delivered, further concurrent presentations and workshops plus a second site visit to the Indira Cancer Trust, was achieved. Engagement with the audience on their intentions for future influence were captured, and the closing ceremony





















concluded the conference, with delegates being piped out of the ballroom by KDU musicians.
